After a shock at the city's modernity, I have learned to appreciate Le Havre, its place, its numerous events, its human size which favors exchanges. I set up a project of social inclusion through art, which allowed me to meet many local actors of the culture.

## Jasper Boll, 19 years old

Born in Berlin, I arrived in Le Havre in 2020 after graduating from a school where 104 nationalities were represented! This gave me a taste for Europe and international relations, I chose France, the closest friend of Germany, and then Sciences Po for its reputation and its alliance between political science and economics.
